Fashionable Furs

Furs added the finishing touch to an outfit in the Model A era. A single fox fur was usually 30"-35" long not including the tail. Foxes came in several colors, including silver, white and red. A "Vicuna Fox" (llama fleece) was furred on both sides and featured a clasp in head and snap fasteners in the paws.



Fur scarves were worn while shopping, an outdoor tea, fancy luncheon, even a sporting events. For evening a dressy scarf, fabric cape or formal wrap was worn, not a fur scarf.

Fur scarves came in Australian Fox, Russian Fox and North American Fox. Imitation fox came in squirrel, moufflon (sheep), vicuna (llama) and opossum.

Two and three skin neckpieces were made of small fox, baum marten and sable and very expensive. In 1930 a less expensive neckpieces were made of mink, marten, squirrel, opossum or moufflon.
